### An Evening with Brad Wall & Farms at the Table Conference

Farm & Food Care SK kicked off December with two great events! We partnered with the NSBA to present an evening with Brad Wall on December 5th and quickly followed that with our Farms at the Table Conference on December 6th.

On the evening of December 5, Wall told the crowd a 'cautionary tale' of Western Canada's energy sector, where detractors have been able to negatively paint the industry and stagnate development. The agriculture sector needs to learn from that lesson, Wall insisted, drawing a comparison to the 1993 movie *Tombstone* in which one brother dies in the arms of another. "Energy and agriculture are the foundation of much of what is good in this province." He encouraged the audience to speak up for these industries: "We need to be less circumspect, more bold. The consequences are the jobs of your neighbours."

The Farms at the Table Conference once again was filled with great speakers, covering a wide selection of topics. Tamar Haspel, a correspondent with *The Washington Post*, challenged attendees to ask themselves: "When was the last time I changed my mind on something important?" A producer panel of three producers, Travis Heide, Adrienne Ivey and Ross McDonald, discussed different production methods, such as organic cropping and raising beef using hormones and without hormones. Terry Tyson, General Manager with Grain Millers of Canada, explained how his company has adapted to meet consumer demands. Patricia Chuey, a well-known dietitian and food commentator, spoke about food fads, consumer trends and Canada's new Food Guide. Lots of food for thought at this year's conference!
